### **EDUCATIONAL**

### **INTRODUCTION**

The combination of Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and Tuberculosis has been termed "accursed duet". The double burden of TB and Human Immunodediciency Virus (HIV), together with increasing rates of MDR-TB (Multidrug Resistant Tuberculosis) and XDR-TB (Extensively drug Resistant Tuberculosis), complicates the management.

### **BURDEN**

HIV positive patients are 30 times more likely than HIV negative people to develop TB. The chronic immune stimulation resulting from active TB accelerates HIV/AIDS disease progression. In 2013 there were 1.1 million new TB/HIV coinfected cases globally, accounting for 12% of incident TB cases and 360 000 deaths. The annual risk of developing TB disease in people living with HIV/AIDS who are coinfected with M. tuberculosis is 5 to 15 percent.

### **IMPACT OF HIV ONTB**

Usually a person infected with Mycobacterium tuberculosis with a healthy immune system does not become ill but is able to eliminate the infection without taking antituberculosis drugs. This condition is referred to as Latent Tuberculosis Infection. Because of progressive supression of CMI in patients with HIV disease, it has emerged as the single most important risk factor for progression of dormant tuberculosis infection to clinical disease. HIV infected patients with dormant tuberculosis infection will have reactivation of the latent infection because of diminished CMI.An HIV infected person co-infected with M. tuberculosis has a 50 percent lifetime risk of developing TB disease in comparison to only a 10 percent risk in HIV non infected person. This is especially important in India, with an estimated 40 percent of the adult population infected with M. tuberculosis. It is estimated that 50-60 percent of the HIV-infected persons in India will develop TB disease during their life-time.

### **IMPACT OFTB ON HIV**

Untreated TB shortens the survival of patients with HIV infection by accelerating the disease progression.

### **CLINICAL PRESENTATION**

Clinical disease manifestations are largely dependent on the level of immunosuppression. In patients with earlier stages of HIV disease, clinical presentation is of typical tuberculosis. However, more severely immunocompromised individuals have a greater risk of extrapulmonary and disseminated forms of TB. Persons with CD4 cell counts of <200 cells/ml are less likely to present with cavitation and often have atypical features. Most patients with advanced immunosuppression (<100 cells/ml) have extrapulmonary and disseminated forms of TB, positive mycobacterial blood cultures, and atypical chest radiography findings. People living with HIV are more likely to present with extrapulmonary or sputum smear negative TB, as immunosuppression advances. This can result in misdiagnosis or delays in diagnosis.




### **MANAGEMENT**


The basic guidelines to be followed in the treatment of tuberculosis in HIV positive individuals are the same as those for treatment of tuberculosis in seronegative individuals. In HIV-infected persons with TB, Anti Retroviral Therapy (ART) should be initiated during TB treatment regardless of the CD4 cell count. In general early commencement of ART, less than two weeks into TB treatment, is advised if CD4 + T cell count is < 50 cells/mm3. For those with CD4 counts > 50 cells/mm3, it is reasonable to introduce ART within four to eight weeks, once the clinician is satisfied that the TB regimen is being well tolerated and that compliance with HIV drugs is likely. For those HIV/TB coinfected patients with relatively preserved CD4 counts (> 200 cells/mm), ART is still recommended although commencement is less urgent and timing will be weighed against the risk and benefits. Transient worsening of symptoms and signs of tuberculosis or radiological deterioration after the initiation of ART, despite a reduction in HIV load and immunological recovery, is known as immune reconstitution inflammatory syndrome (IRIS). Manifestations of IRIS include fever, lymph node enlargement, worsening respiratory symptoms and signs, cold abscess, psoas abscesses, and worsening central nervoussystem lesions (tuberculoma and meningitis).

### CONCLUSION

Overlap of TB/HIV co-infection with drug-resistant TB presents a tremendous challenge and threatens recent progress in reducing the mortality associated with both diseases.
